

DUDDON RIVER ASSOCIATION THE YEAR AHEAD

We are looking forward to another productive year making a positive impact on our local environment, monitoring habitats and improving the health of our river system which includes the River Duddon, Black Beck, the Lickle and Kirkby Pool.

Thanks to our wonderful volunteers, 2025 has seen great progress across the many areas we are working on as part of the Duddon Catchment Project in conjunction with our partner organisations: Sustainable Duddon, South Lakes Red Squirrel Group and South Cumbria Rivers Trust.

We have removed more Himalayan balsam (a non-native invasive species) than ever before, have conducted MoRPh, riverfly and electrofishing surveys, placed dormouse boxes in suitable woodland habitat, helped the red squirrel population by controlling greys, monitored water quality, bats, mink and other wildlife, built leaky dams and planted trees. We have also organised a guided walk at Sandscale Haws, enjoyed a fabulous Community Lunch and have taken part in Thwaites Gala and the Broughton Show. It's been an incredible year and there's more to come in 2026!

Please join us for our AGM (see opposite). All those interested in finding out more about what we do are very welcome to attend. It will be followed by supper and a chance to catch up informally. Annual Exhibition from the DVLHG Archives
Saturday 24 January at the Victory Hall 11.00am – 2.00pm

Again, we have rummaged through our archives to bring out historical photographs and documents to tell the tale of Broughton, Dunnerdale and the Duddon Valley from long ago.

Among the displays will be the early Parish Magazines from the 1870s and items belonging to eminent Victorians who literally helped shape the town, including letters home from a soldier serving on the Western Front and the diaries of a young girl from Broughton Mills.

This year we are joined by the Broughton Mills, Woodland and Foxfield WI who will be on hand to display and chat about a collection of albums and documents dating back to the 1930s and which were collected to celebrate their 50th Anniversary. MESSAGE FROM OUR MP MICHELLE SCROGHAM

As we bid farewell to 2025, I would like to place on record my thanks to everyone who has worked hard to deliver improvements in our communities over the past 12 months.

That includes all those who worked tirelessly to re-open post office services in Broughton, a fantastic example of the strength of local community spirit.

I would also like to thank the thousands of local people who have supported my campaign to resist plans to permanently downgrade Level Three care at Furness General Hospital.

We have many positive developments to reflect on but the highlights for me have included the work to reduce the levels of child poverty locally.

I was therefore pleased to see the abolition of the two-child benefit cap which will directly benefit more than 1,600 children from our area.

Children growing up in poverty are less likely to work as adults and on average earn 25 per cent less, so not only is it morally right to address it, but it's also a financially sound argument.

We know that 70 per cent of those affected by the two child benefit limit are from working families struggling with the cost of living. This is a national shame that I am proud we're fixing.

I have also been pleased by the progress made on improving mobile connectivity in rural areas. For too many years we have been held back by poor phone signal which impact so many residents and local businesses.

I have therefore welcomed the Government's clear ambitions in the 10-Year Infrastructure Strategy on rollout of high-quality, standalone 5G signal.

A Shared Rural Network mast has already been activated in the Duddon Valley, helping local residents, businesses and visitors stay better connected. This mast is already making a real difference in an area where for a long time, many have struggled with poor signal and patchy coverage.

Of course, coverage alone is not enough. We must also focus on resilience: on whether networks stay up during power outages, extreme weather or other emergencies. Most people do not come to me with concerns about coverage maps. They talk about their phone not working when they need it the most. I am grateful to the Mobile Network Operators that have sat down with me as part of my campaign with fellow Cumbrian MPs to ensure we see further progress being made on resilience.

Whatever the new year brings you can be certain that I will be fighting for the improvements we need to see in our communities.

TWENTY-YEAR PLAN TO RESTORE NATURE AND SUPPORT FELL FARMING IN THE DUDDON VALLEY

The Upper Duddon Landscape Recovery brings together farmers, environmental organisations and the local community to manage 2,800 hectares of land in the Duddon Valley. The 20-year project, which started in late 2025, is led by the University of Leeds together with local farmers, the National Trust, Forestry England, South Cumbria Rivers Trust, the University of Cumbria and Natural England. The project is funded by DEFRA as well as a range of businesses and foundations.

The project will work together with ten land managers, six of them tenant farmers, supporting them to restore habitats and enhance nature across the landscape.

Paddy Deady, the Project Farm Manager and one of the tenant farmers involved in the project, said: "The most significant change I expect to see is an increase in the number of insects and the number of birds. Within a few years I hope we will really be able to demonstrate fully how the project is benefitting nature, benefitting the local community and benefitting the farming community who live here year-round. The project will create and support 14 jobs in the valley providing an important source of employment in the local area."

John Hodgson leads on volunteering and school visits for the project. He said: "We will be able to expand our volunteering and school sessions to include working on local farms as well as in Hardknott Forest. Last year we hosted dozens of volunteer days and visits from local schools, including some brilliant sessions with Millom School, who helped us plant trees and wildflowers, and learned about local wildlife."

The project will restore meadows, heathland, wood pasture, scrub, woodland, temperate rainforest and blanket bog. Alongside restoration of habitats, the project will also help the recovery of local wildlife such as the tree pipit, pine marten and water vole. It is also set to deliver a range of environmental benefits including a reduction in downstream flood risk. River restoration work will improve water quality in the River Duddon and its tributaries.



A volunteering programme will provide opportunities for the local community and visitors to contribute to nature recovery. A new community-based wildflower and tree nursery will grow the flowers and trees needed to help habitats recover.

Steve Jolley, project officer from the National Trust said: "We're really excited to be part of this project which has brought together local farmers to deliver sustainable farming across the Duddon Valley. The area has a strong tradition of fell farming and the National Trust is looking forward to seeing this continue whilst restoring nature in this beautiful part of the Lake District." The project has already started work and has restored peat bog, rebuilt a large section of bridleway and is felling and using larch trees from Hardknott Forest to provide fence posts and timber for the farms within the project area.

NEW MOUNTAIN RESCUE BASE



People may have noticed the large steel framework construction being erected near the Broughton Supply, Foxfield. This will be the new base for the Duddon and Furness Mountain Rescue Team. At the moment we are the only team in the Lake District without its own purpose built base. In 2016 the team made the decision to raise funds to build its own permanent base. As always with new projects, delays were incurred, difficulties with landownership, planning and access issues meant it took longer than anticipated. At long last in March of last year all the relevant approvals were in place and work began in earnest. The contractor first had to sink sixty concrete piles to the depth of 13 metres to give a solid foundation to enable the building to be constructed. Passers-by will now see that the construction has a roof and blockwork is taking shape to the walls. At present the new build is on budget and on time, and it is hoped that all work will be completed by April 2026, and the team will be able to occupy their new base.

Many thanks to the businesses, both national and local, clubs, societies and individuals who have helped raise £1.2 million to fund this project. I hope when I write again in April the project will be finished and the team will be able to extend invitations to our opening.

Looking for Answers

Have you ever been in a situation when something that thought you knew was a rock solid, believable truth, turns out to be actually based on a shaky foundation? The song about the wise man who built his house on the rock and the foolish man who built his house on the sand springs to mind. It all comes crashing down! It happens a lot in soap operas where blossoming relationships fail at the first hint of unfaithfulness and we almost rejoice when we can smugly say – I told you so – when Johnny lets Vivienne down and then they have a blazing row about it.

The people who were convinced that the world was flat or that the Sun went round the earth must have been some of those who did not want to believe the new evidence, not wanting to lose face or admit others knew better than they did. Those who advanced the new theories or purported new knowledge often needed courage to persist and the conviction to stand up against the ingrained norms, prejudice and invested interests of the day.


