Seventeen members met at the Broughton Mills Reading Room on Wednesday 1st October. We opened our meeting with a moment of quiet remembrance for our dear friend, Mary Dixon.

Minutes from our September meeting were approved, and various events and future plans were discussed. As usual we have a busy programme to look forward to in the coming months including our 'Chippy Tea' supper at the Greyhound on 10th October and celebrating our 80th birthday in December. We then welcomed our speaker for the evening, Richard Wilcock, who spoke to us about the notorious case of Peter Sutcliffe who became known as the 'Yorkshire Ripper'. Richard is a local retired CID officer who had been in his post at the time of the Sutcliffe crimes and who had a keen, more personal interestbut more later!!!

Many of us remembered reading of his crimes back when Sutcliffe murdered thirteen women between 1975 and 1980 and spread fear across the country. It was still a difficult and very sad story to listen to and we sensed Richard's frustration with the mistakes and oversights made by the investigation team at the time and how hampered they were without all the modern-day aids to police work today...DNA, computers, mobile phones, and CCTV.

As Richard neared the end of his talk, he asked us to consider how evidence could be put to a jury with very little foundation without vital science-based proof. He then asked his colleague, Joe, to sit and answer a few questions! We were horrified to learn that Joe had been interviewed and taken into police custody on eleven occasions while this enquiry was at its height.... for the simple reason that, as a haulage contractor, he was often in the area when the crimes were committed and, unknown to him, his lorry numberplates were from a previously stolen vehicle! We could only imagine what this quietly spoken man had gone through during this time! Richard (and Joe's) presentation certainly made us think.

Richard was warmly thanked by Jan Ashworth. Our November meeting and AGM will be held in Broughton Mills Reading Room on Wednesday 5th November at 7.30pm when our member, Lynn Cook, will tell us of her climb of Kilimanjaro. Do come and join us...you just never know what speakers we might surprise you with (!!) - you'd be made very welcome.

Friends of the X112 bus group update



It is now eleven years since the Friends of the X112 was formed. Our formation has enabled Blueworks Taxis Ltd to continue running local bus services between Barrow, Ulverston and Coniston linking many small rural communities which, in 2014, were faced with the possiblity of all the previous rural bus services being withdrawn.

Those eleven years have produced a quite unique partnership between the community and a local bus company. This has been backed up by funding provided by many, mostly Cumbria based, grant funding organisations and, in more recent years, Westmorland and Furness Council.

We do have a few younger members who work very hard but we desperately require two younger people (we were in our late 60s when we started!) to be officials on our committee to help with secretarial work and marketing. If it is possible to spread that information around in the hope that someone might be interested to help we would be extremely grateful. For the time being the 'Friends' will continue to operate for as long as we can but this clearly does rely on finding the funds to keep going and that is the hard part!

A POST OFFICE FOR BROUGHTON...

Great news!

Post Office Ltd has scheduled the opening of Broughton's new post office branch in the Tourist Information Centre for 1 pm on Tuesday 9th December.

Our post office counter service days and hours will be:

Monday: 0900-1300 & 1400-1630 Tuesday: 0900-1300 & 1400-1630 Thursday: 0900-1300 & 1400-1630

Friday: 0900-1200

Our **community shop and tourist information service** will start up earlier on **Saturday 8th November**. These opening hours are still to be finalised but will be similar to the PO ones + Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. However, due to the fit-out process for the post office, the shop will be closed 24th – 28th November.

The shop will be selling a range of items such as greetings cards, wrapping paper, stamps, stationery, local books, guides and maps, confectionery, gifts, souvenirs and Cumbrian artisanal products. These will expand and change according to demand – so do come in and let us know what you would like to see stocked if we don't have it on sale. By buying from the shop you will be sustaining the provision of our community's post office service, so we do hope you will give your support to both.

If you would like to get more involved, it's not too late to join our lovely team of shop and information service volunteers. Broughton Community Services CIC

POST BOX LOCATION ISSUE

Following safety and accessibility concerns raised by residents about the proposed siting of a post box on Station Road, Broughton Community Services CIC and Michelle Scrogham MP have been urging Royal Mail to reconsider and to site the post box outside the new post office branch on The Square instead.

Unfortunately, despite numerous letters, photographic evidence and media coverage, Royal Mail's Collections Customer Operations Manager in Lancaster maintains that the Station Road site is a safe one. In addition, he insists that, due to traffic and insufficient parking, it is unsafe for the posties to empty a post box on The Square – although Royal Mail vans will be stopping here to collect parcels from the post office.

Since post box installations fall under permitted development, there is no recourse to making a planning-based objection. But Broughton Community Services CIC and Cllr Brereton have recently brought the issue to the attention of Highways which will conduct their own appraisal of Station Road. If Highways finds that there is indeed a road safety issue, permission to install a post box at this site will not be granted.

If this is the case, Broughton Community Services CIC, in conjunction with your elected representatives, will continue to press Royal Mail for the post box to be sited in the best and most logical place – outside Broughton Post Office on The Square.



MESSAGE FROM OUR MP MICHELLE SCROGHAM

I feel sure that Parish Pump readers will join me in welcoming the news that Waterloo House Surgery in Millom will once again be funded to provide a minor injuries service for their patients.

Around six months ago health bosses

dropped their funding which allowed GPs to offer this service. This was completely wrong – particularly in rural areas like ours – because of the difficulty getting to the nearest alternative service. I raised my concerns with the Lancashire and South Cumbria Integrated Care Board.

I am pleased to report that having reviewed the decision this funding has now been reintroduced for Waterloo House Surgery in Millom along with surgeries in Ambleside and Hawkshead. It is a positive development, but we need to make sure this decision is extended to cover other rural practices. I am continuing to make that case, and will keep local people updated.

There is more good news for those readers who, like me, were alarmed to hear about health chiefs' plans to permanently close level 3 critical care at Furness General Hospital. Around 80 people attended a meeting of Westmorland and Furness Council's Health and Adult Scrutiny meeting in Barrow town hall on September 24 which became heated after members of the public were not allowed to air their views.

However, I was pleased to see that the committee has recommended that public consultations need to take place on the proposals. This is an important step in our campaign to stop the downgrade. We need a proper plan for recruiting the consultants so that we can reintroduce the full service as soon as possible.

It is important that local people have their say on a full set of options – including an option to reintroduce the service. That is why I organised a public meeting to be held at Hawcoat Park on Saturday, October 18 and as I type this it promises to be a full house with more than 200 worried residents saying they are turning up – and that tells its own story. While the ICB have declined to attend the meeting will go ahead and I will make sure that attendees' concerns are recorded and fed back to the board.

Our Labour government was elected to deliver change. Part of our commitment was to get the NHS back on its feet and fit for the future. Additional funding is being invested, and reforms are being introduced, to improve health and care services. Cutting critical care services for our area – especially when the population is expected to boom in the coming years – is a negative development we intend to resist all the way.

A595 Grizebeck Improvement Scheme

We can confirm the project is progressing to programme, and you will have noticed significant developments on site. The construction of the new bridge is nearing completion and is scheduled to open to traffic in early November. Once the new bridge is operational, the temporary road will be removed.

To safely connect the new bridge with the existing road network, a temporary closure of A595 will be required. During this period, the temporary road will also be closed to prepare for the removal.

The A595 will be closed between the Community Hall and Dove Ford on the following weekend:

Saturday 1st November - Sunday 2nd November

Closures will be in effect from 7:00 AM on Saturday until 5:00 PM on Sunday on both weekends.

A signed diversion will be in place via the **A5092**, **A590**, and **A595**, passing through **Greenodd**, **Ulverston**, and **Askamin-Furness**. Access will be maintained for **emergency service vehicles** throughout the closure period.

We understand that road closures can be disruptive, and we sincerely appreciate your continued patience and cooperation as we work to deliver the scheme. We will keep you updated as we continue our works via the Westmorland and Furness website, our social media pages and the A595 Grizebeck Project mailing list.

There have been some interesting times – we have been snowed in, blocked in by falling trees, wondered whether the rain would ever stop and also wondered when it would ever rain again. We've moved cattle because of lack of water and, more recently, because of an over abundance of acorns. We have also marvelled at the beauty of the hills, mountains and coastline, seen the Northern Lights from the fell and picked loads of blackberries. But, more significantly than all of that, we have met some great people and have felt very welcomed into the community.

We have recently been celebrating harvest in our churches. In Woodland we had a harvest service followed by supper in the village hall where friends and neighbours gathered to thank God for his provision and blessings, to donate to a food collection and to share a meal together.
